


# What is Shine?





Detentions are set on the day of the misconduct. A text message will be sent to make you aware. Any incident that occurs after 2pm will mean the detention will take place the following day.




# Behaviour at Drayton Manor

# Mobile Phones and Online Safety


- We have a 'no mobile phone' policy

# English at Drayton Manor

### **English Learning Journey**

#### Year 7

Drayton Manor's Year 7 English curriculum is designed to build on the foundations of English established in primary school, whilst stretching pupils through introducing them to challenging subject matter, themes and core concepts they will revisit and hone over the course of their secondary school career.







**CLASS NOVEL & NON-FICTION WRITING** 

**GENRE STUDIES & POETRY** 

#### **AUTUMN 1**

Our first unit introduces students to the study of a novel in its entirety. Pupils will read the text in full, focusing intially on comprehension before developing their analysis of novel's prominent themes and its main character, Alem; an 11 year old refugee who navigates his new life in the UK. Alongside their study of Refugee Boy, students will undertake a supplementary writing unit in which they explore further the indirect effects of conflict; primarily, the ongoing refugee crisis. They will begin to understand the concept of form, audience and purpose and write their own pieces of rhetoric.

#### SPRING

Building upon pupils' existing experience in creative writing, this unit aims to support students refine their approach to narrative writing going forward. Through studying three different genres of fiction, students will unpack the writer's craft; the fundamentals of language and structure in particular. After the half term students will begin their first study of poetry at secondary school; we have chosen poems from both the literary canon and contemporary poetry which express ideas relating to identity and the self. Importantly, the anthology of poems reflects a diversity of experience.

#### SUMMER

Running over the entire summer term, this unit will introduce students to the study of Shakespeare and stagecraft. Pupils will focus on the portrayal of love and relationships in the play, looking at specific key characters, alongside developing their understanding of Elizabethan England. Pupils will then end the year by studying a collection of Shakespearean sonnets. In particular, considering how this form has developed over centuries, before going on to create their own.





# Building a culture of reading at home

Cultivate discussions around reading at home using VIPERS

- Vocabulary what new words have they learnt? What do they mean? How can you use them in a sentence?
- Inference what can you infer about a place, character, object based on the writer's description?
- Prediction what do you think will happen next? Why?
- Explanation which part of the story has been the most interesting and why? What are the characters motivations?
- Retrieval what happened in the last chapter? How are the characters connected?
- Summarise what has been the main events of the section you have read? Or the story so far?

If stuck, students should seek help from their teacher before their homework is due.


Homework must be completed in the orange homework book, which your child will bring into school on Fridays (or on the day of the next maths lesson).


# **Compulsory Tab**

**Retrieval Practice** 

## How do children learn?



- Our approach to teaching and learning is rooted in cognitive science
- Research has helped to identify six effective learning strategies that promote better outcomes for students and teachers
- Today, we will be considering how you can support your child using one of these strategies at home: retrieval practice

# Retrieval Practice: What is it and why do we do it?

- Retrieval practice requires students to withdraw something they have already learned from their long term memory into their working memory
- Retrieving something that was taught a while back initially requires high levels of effort but over time, with continued practice, retrieval requires less effort and important knowledge becomes easier to recall
- Students who used mainly retrieval practice remembered over 50% more than those who just read and re-read during revision
- Those students who used retrieval practice for their revision were able to cope with the demands of exams and achieve better results


